

#### Mapping Cambridge IGCSE<sup>®</sup> (9–1) English Literature 0477 to Cambridge IGCSE<sup>®</sup> Literature (English) 0486

#### Introduction

This document maps the differences between Cambridge IGCSE<sup>®</sup> (9–1) English Literature 0477 and Cambridge IGCSE<sup>®</sup> Literature (English) 0486, summarising the key changes and retained features at both component and syllabus level.

Cambridge IGCSE<sup>®</sup> (9–1) English Literature 0477, has built on the unique strengths and traditions of the current Cambridge IGCSE Literature (English) syllabuses, while complying with the requirements outlined in the Department for Education (DfE) subject content requirements for the new GCSE English Literature (9–1) qualifications for use in the UK schools from 2017. The 0477 qualification will be offered to schools in England from 2017. Cambridge will continue to offer an international version of the 0486 syllabus with a separate syllabus code for our international centres to take.

For schools who offer the Cambridge IGCSE Literature (English) 0486 qualification, many aspects of 0477 will be familiar, and the assessment methods consistent. For new Centres, the 0477 offers a coherent, accessible and innovative syllabus for the study of Literature at this level. Cambridge IGCSE<sup>®</sup> (9–1) is also known as a Cambridge International Level1/Level 2 IGCSE (9-1) Certificate.

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#### Summary of key changes made for syllabus 0477

- The grading system is now in line with the new GCSE 9-1 grade nomenclature; grade 4 is equivalent to a grade C.
- There are three compulsory components, Papers 1, 2 and 3 which are assessed by examination only.
- There are no optional papers.
- There is no coursework option.
- All texts are closed book.
- There are minor adjustments to the syllabus aims and assessment objectives 1-4.
- There is a new assessment objective for Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar (SPaG).
- The weightings of the assessment objectives have been adjusted for Paper 3 to reflect the inclusion of SPaG.

#### **Summary of retained features**

- 0477 remains a linear assessment, with all components set in the same examination series.
- The four strands of the assessment objectives remain the same for Papers 1 and 2.
- The syllabus aims and objectives are the same in principle with only slight adjustments for emphasis.
- The requirement to answer on Poetry, Prose and Drama (including Shakespeare) is the same.
- Generic marking criteria and their application are unchanged.
- The number of questions candidates must answer on set text papers in the examination as a whole remains unchanged.
- Types and style of wording of passage-based and essay questions remain unchanged.

Five components are available: one compulsory and the others in a variety of combinations. Poetry Prose and Drama are compulsory elements but Drama may be assessed through closed or open texts. 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	Paper 1 Poetr	y and Prose	
Time allocated 1 hr 30 mins. This is a compulsory written paper. All questions carry equal marks. Candidates answer two questions, one from Section A (Poetry) and one from Section B (Prose). There is a choice of two essay questions, on each text: 14 poems from one of 3 collections including a Cambridge anthology, and 8 prose texts, one of them a Cambridge anthology of short stories Relevant passages are printed in the examination paper. Candidates may not take their texts into the exam room. All questions encourage an informed personal response and test all four assessment objectives AO1, 2, 3 and 4.	Time allocated 1 hr 30 mins. This is a compulsory written paper. All questions carry equal marks. Candidates answer two questions, one from Section A (Poetry) and one from Section B (Prose). There is a choice of two questions on each text, one essay and one passage-based question: 15 poems from a choice of 2 sets from a Cambridge anthology, and 7 Prose texts, one of them a Cambridge anthology of short stories. Relevant passages are printed in the examination paper. Candidates may not take their texts into the exam room. All questions encourage an informed personal response and test all four assessment objectives AO1, 2, 3 and 4.	Some set text changes. <ul> <li>Time allocated: 1 hour 15 mins, of which 20 minutes is advised for reading and planning.</li> <li>Component 4 is an optional written paper.</li> <li>Candidates answer one question from a choice of two. Both questions require a critical appreciation of previously unseen literary writing printed in the question paper.</li> <li>One question is based on a passage of literary writing (such as an extract from a novel or short story); the other is based on a poem or extract from a poem.</li> <li>All questions encourage an informed personal response and test all four assessment objectives AO1, 2, 3 and 4.</li> </ul>	Time allocated: 1 hour 30 mins of which 20 minutes is advised for reading and planning. Component 3 is a compulsory written paper. Candidates answer one question from a choice of two. Both questions require a critical <b>comparison</b> of previously unseen literary writing printed in the question paper. One question is based on two passages of literary writing (such as extracts from a novel or short story); the other is based on two poems or extracts from poems. All questions encourage an informed personal response and test all four assessment objectives AO1, 2, 3 and 4. Spelling, punctuation and Grammar are assessed here.	The requirement to compare unseen texts is a key change. The assessment of Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar is a new requirement which is satisfied in Paper 3 of syllabus 0477.	Critical appreciation of unseen poetry and prose. All questions encourage an informed personal response and test all four assessment objectives AO1, 2, 3 and 4. The written paper is an externally set assessment marked by Cambridge.
